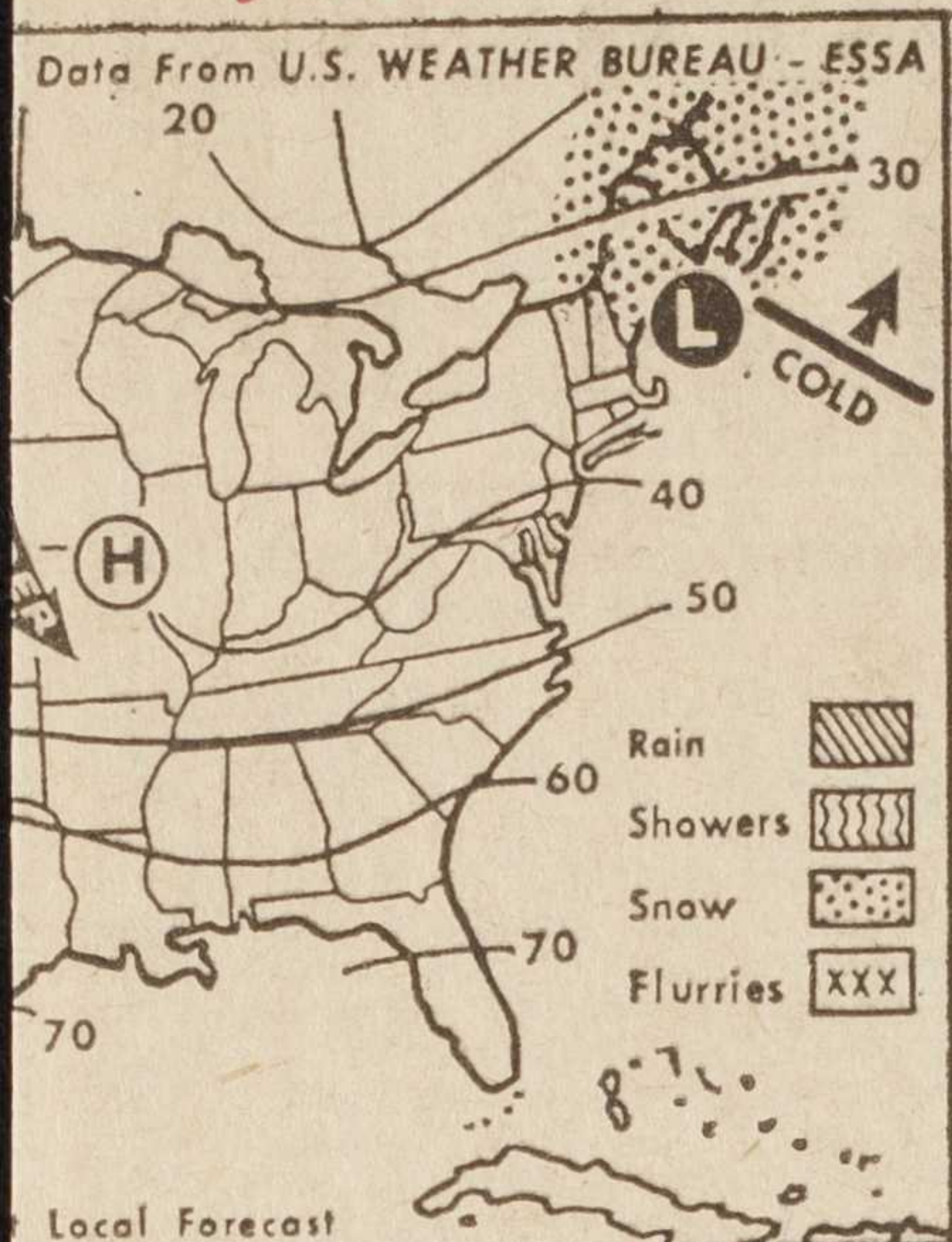

Cloudy and Cool, High in Middle 40s

Me. Snow amounts up to 13 inches were reported in northwest Rhode Island and from the Blue Hill Observatory near Boston.

Major Map Features: At 7 p.m. (EST) Yesterday—A low was centered southeast of Massachusetts. A high was centered over eastern Missouri. A stationary front extended from western Kansas across the Nebraska Panhandle and then through the northwest corners of Wyoming and Montana. A cold front stretched from West-Central Oregon along the northwest border of Nevada and then through South Central California. A large low was centered about 200 miles west of extreme northern California.

Predicted Map Positions: For 7 p.m. (EST) Today—A low will be centered east of Massachusetts. A high will be located over Kentucky. A stationary front will stretch from southeast Oklahoma through a low in east central Wyoming to northwest Montana. A low will be centered over north central Nevada with a cold front extending southeast and then southward along the western border of Arizona. A low will be off the Oregon coast.

Uptown Rezoning Rejected

The D.C. Zoning Commission yesterday rejected a request by 30 property owners for higher-density office building zoning on a strip of Wisconsin Avenue from Whitehaven Parkway north to Calvert Street nw.

The proposed change would have allowed the construction of new office buildings with floor space equal to three times the land area. The present zoning allows office buildings with floor space equal to twice the land area.

The area involved in the request, which also included one block on either side of Wisconsin Avenue, presently has a number of large office buildings.

Black Rally at AU

The black students organization at American University has called a campus rally at noon today to protest the administration's refusal yesterday to grant campus buildings for an "inaugura gala" for Dick Gregory.

"Moose" Foster, president of the Organization of African and Afro-American Students, said the rally would take place on the steps of Mary Graydon Center. Foster and other students met with University officials yesterday in an attempt to gain permission to use two gyms for the March 4 event.

An administration spokesman said University policy is to allow only student groups and activities in the University's buildings. He said the students were told

they could sponsor a dance for students and invite Gregory to be the guest of honor.

Libel Suit Dismissed

Judge William C. Pryor of the Court of General Sessions yesterday granted a motion to dismiss a \$20,000 libel suit against The Washington Post Co. growing out of publication of a photograph showing demonstrators leaving St. Matthew's Catholic Cathedral here last Sept. 22.

The suit, originally filed in the U.S. District Court, was brought by Diana Kearny Powell of 1500 Massachusetts ave. nw. In dismissing the suit at the end of the plaintiff's case, Judge Pryor issued an opinion noting that the plaintiff had not established that she was in the photograph. The newspaper was represented by attorney William R. Glendon of the firm of Royall, Koegel and Wells.

Shuttle Flights

The Federal Aviation Administration modified proposed curbs on air operations yesterday, to permit shuttle flights to continue at three cities.

The FAA ruled that extra sections of scheduled flights may be operated without regard to fixed quotas at the major airports serving Washington, New York and Chicago.

The FAA ruled earlier that extra sections would be allowed to exceed quotas only at Washington's Na-

tional Airport. Eastern Airlines protested, claiming that the rule would end its shuttle service between New York and Washington and between New York and Boston. Extra sections are frequently used on that service to insure a seat for every customer.

Embassy Plea Denied

A request for a zoning change to allow for construction of an embassy at 29th and Tilden Streets nw. was turned down yesterday by the D.C. Zoning Commission.

The property involved is now zoned for single-family residences. Richard Eaton, owner of the property, told the Zoning Commission that a change to a special apartment zoning category would allow construction of the proposed Congolese chancery.

In rejecting the request, the Zoning Commission noted that a 1964 act of Congress indicated that chanceries should not be sprinkled in areas containing single-family dwellings.

The Unification Society, which provides transportation for girls attending dances at nearby military installations, announced that there will be, in addition to the regularly scheduled dances this week, a party Friday to mark the opening of an enlarged Marine NCO club at Quantico.
