His portrait of the great Puerto Rican historical figure, Albizu Campos (his comrade-in-arms) is invaluable. Vivid history written by someone who helped make it.

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John Lewis spent time in the summer of 1974 with the Brookside strikers in Harlan County, Kentucky, a historic site in labor history. He not only learned about the miner's struggle, but participated in it. The result is an exciting account of how the Brookside strikers brought the multi-million-dollar utility, Duke Power Company, to its knees.

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The Battle of the Boycott by Kenny Lapidés.

Shows the importance of the consumer boycott in supporting union organizing drives and strikes, a weapon which cannot legally be used by a certified union. Tells about the boycott of Farah slacks, how it led to a \$1.2 million suit against the Center for United Labor Action (a labor support organization), and how the Chicana workers won their union from Farah.

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Blast Furnace Brothers by Vince Copeland.

The story of how a struggle by white workers for the rights of Black workers led to a successful walkout by both Black and white workers in the Lackawanna Bethlehem Steel Plant. This is not just a colorful moment in labor history, but a thoughtful description of an event which may prove to be a precursor of a trend in the labor movement.

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
