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FOREST COMMONS: THE TIME HAS COME

For the more than 200 participants from 19 states at Eastern Kentucky University on March 31st and April 1st, the message was one of deep concern: how are we going to preserve and enhance our American private forestlands? A sizeable portion of our forests (95% of Eastern American woodlands) is threatened by economic pressures and environmental pollution. Chip and pulp mill operators cast a hungry eye on these lands; air pollution continues to take its toll. While participants possessed a wide range of opinion and background, they voiced satisfaction in the process of soliciting suggestions for actions within a small discussion group format. Among ideas voiced at the conference:

- * a need to regulate private woodlands in some degree;

- * this regulation need not be oppressive in nature;

- * governmental agencies should spend as much time assisting the private small woodland operators as in caring for large corporate loggers and wood products operators.
