Dear Ms. Higgins,

I am enclosing a copy of the letter to President Reagan we spoke about by telephone on February 22. At that time, you took my name and number and promised to put a tracer on my letter and let me know how it is progressing. So far, I have had no reply or acknowledgement.

As you will see, the letter is important and not at all unfriendly. It should have had some response by this time.

Now, we are about to send copies out to more than two hundred of the nation's leading newspaper editors in the hope that they will also understand and publish it widely. However, we have been waiting for some response from your office which could be included in our letter to the newspapers. It would be unfortunate if no response could be reported.

At the same time, I am in communication with a friend who has recently returned from the Soviet Union where he has met with some of the leadership of that nation. He will be receiving copies of this letter and the letter to Mr. Reagan and may forward them to the people with whom he has been in contact. A similar suggestion might then be made to the Soviet leadership so that they might be more open to whatever Mr. Reagan decides to do.

We will recall that our Republican President, Dwight Eisenhower once said: "Some day the people will want peace so badly that the governments will have to get out of their way and let them have it." No doubt that time is fast approaching and it will have been to Mr. Reagan's great credit to have initiated the process.

We will be looking forward to a prompt reply from your office.
