

ACORN members have been working not only in Boston but in Little Rock, Arkansas, in Philadelphia, in Columbia, S.C., and other cities as well to have developers who have received federal and other public monies to contribute to the development of jobs for the long-term unemployed by a commitment to hire 50% CETA-eligibles through First Source Agreements. That is, a developer would use CETA--or the city-run manpower agency--as the "first source" for prospective workers in various job categories. Tuesday's "Work-In" is part of a nationwide, coordinated action to pressure developments as well as City Administration's that this important "linkage" must be made if any progress is going to be made to alleviate the depression-era unemployment levels in low and moderate income communities.
