

II. United States March for Victory—October 3, 1970

For two and one-half hours, thousands of persons — some estimated 200,000 — marched down Pennsylvania Avenue and gathered for a rally at the foot of the Washington Monument. They came from every state in the union; even Alaska and Hawaii were represented as well as several Canadian provinces. One of the things that contributed to the great interest in this march was that Vice-President Ky of South Vietnam had agreed to speak at the rally. Even though Ky was prevented from coming, a formal banquet was still held in his honor by the March for Victory committee, and he was able to send a message with a representative from the South Vietnamese Embassy.

The March for Victory challenged not only the nation but the whole free world to face the issue of aggressive Communism, and the 20th Century Reformation Hour still issues that same challenge.



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
