At 5:00 p.m. on Saturday, 11 July 1998, the League of the South will unveil a twice life-size equestrian statue of Confederate General Nathan Bedford Forrest adjacent to I-65 south of Nashville, Tennessee. The League takes great pride in honouring this incomparable Confederate hero.

The Forrest statue is the work of renowned Nashville artist, Jack Kershaw, who is also a Founder and members of the Board of Directors of the League of the South. The statue will be the centrepiece of a flag park located one mile north of the Brentwood exit on I-65. To reach the site from the south, take the Brentwood exit, turn left (west) and go to Franklin Road; turn right on Franklin Road and go two miles and look for parking signs. From the north, take Harding Place exit, turn left (east) and go to Franklin Road; turn right on to Franklin Road and go two miles and look for parking signs.

In addition to the unveiling ceremony, there will be speeches from League officers and live period music. Confederate re-enactors are needed for the ceremony--if you'd like to volunteer, call Jack Kershaw at (615) 292-2316. We hope to have a large crowd from across the South, and we encourage attendees to bring Confederate flags and show their Southern Pride to the Yankee liberal media.
