

I. March for Victory — April 4, 1970

March for Victory Challenges March Against Death

Coming from every section, every State of the United States, and also from eastern and western Canada, 100,000 patriots, who emphasized, "In God We Trust," called for victory in Vietnam as they marched down the Capital's famed Pennsylvania Avenue and assembled about the Washington Monument. The March for Victory, April 4, 1970, will go down in the history books of the nation as a direct challenge to the March Against Death, November 15, 1969. The singing, praying marchers, carrying their banners and their signs, a seemingly unending company, walked for two and one-half hours as they made their way to the Monument grounds and gathered in full view of the White

House. Never in the history of Washington has any such march been held. The call was for prayer and Bible reading in schools, for victory over Communism in Vietnam and throughout the world, and for parents to have freedom of choice in the education of their children.

The March exceeded that which had been anticipated. For one day the Capital was commanded by those who carried Bibles and wanted men everywhere to repent, to believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and turn to the God who is the author of liberty. Washington truly belonged that day to those who want to bring the boys home with honor when the victory is won.
