Retired Naval Officer To Run For President

MERRIMACK — Rear Admr. Ira E. McMillan (USN ret.), of Berkeley, Calif., will soon become one of the newest candidates to toss his hat into the ring in the New Hampshire State first in the nation Presidential primary, said E. William Gaedtke of Edward Lane.

Gaedtke, a public relations man for Adm. McMillan, said the retired service executive is expected to visit the Granite State in the near future to file his candidacy on the America First Committee ticket.

The local public relations man for Adm. McMillan, said the candidate is negotiating with Republican presidential aspirant Ronald Reagan for the vice-presidency.

"He would be willing to run as vice president for Reagan, if they can come to an agreement," said Gaedtke. "If they can't reach terms, the admiral will be filing for President here."

Admiral McMillan will be entering all but one of the nation's primaries, said Gaedtke. "All with the exception of the State of New York."

Gaedtke said the major issues the retired admiral is addressing include the CIA and FBI probes, the United Nations position and Secretary of State Henry Kissinger.

"The admiral doesn't believe a foreign born should be in the position he (Kissinger) occupies," said Gaedtke. The Merrimack resident said that Admiral McMillan had attempted to end the war in Viet Nam months before the cease fire was announced by former President Richard M. Nixon and Kissinger.

"He (Admiral McMillan) made arrangements for a cease fire and told Nixon and Kissinger about it," said Gaedtke. Gaedtke said the admiral was told by Kissinger that the Nixon reelection committee was going to make that announcement just before the election to swing votes.
