## **Building a Culture of Primary Palliative Care through Early Exposure: Clinical Integration with an Emphasis on Surgical Specialties**

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### Background

• LCME does not mandate palliative care education, though all specialties encounter palliative care related conversations<sup>1</sup>.

 Integration of primary palliative care skills throughout medical training enables longitudinal learning and exposure to communication skills.

#### Goal

 Develop primary palliative care educational experiences through three phases spanning from preclinical years of medical school through

residency.

3 Phases

Preclinical Elective (Death & Dying: An **Exploration of End-of-Life Care**)


Surgical Palliative Care Clerkship Elective

SurgTalk: A Novel Surgical Serious **Illness Communication Course** 

### Methods

 Anonymous and voluntary survey emailed to all students at the Warren Alpert Medical School of Brown University

Results (n=68)



#### Conclusions

- Students believe palliative care education in medical school is important and should be integrated into the curriculum
- Students believe all physicians should have basic palliative care education
- Students believe palliative care is valuable in surgical specialties

#### **Future Directions**

- Enroll students into the clerkship elective and collect data regarding their experience
- Develop and distribute surveys to surgical residents who participated in SurgTalk
- Obtain feedback from the Death and Dying preclinical elective to improve it in the future
