Coe Studies Praised

Samuel B. Pettengill, Director of the Coe Foundation's American Studies Program, said he was highly pleased with ACC's American Studies Program which was inaugurated at the 1957 Summer School.

The study program was made possible by a \$9,500 grant from the Coe Foundation in New York City. Forty-five Texas teachers participated, taking a course in American history and in education.

The program was climaxed July 9 by a banquet in Catchings Cafeteria. Mr. Pettengill was speaker for the occasion. Four other guest speakers appeared before Coe Scholars during the six-weeks American Studies program. The two courses were taught by Dr. Orval Filbeck, professor of psychology and education, and Dr. John Stevens, assistant president of ACC.

Science Grant Received

Abilene Christian College has received a \$3,300 check from the Research Corporation of New York City for continuation of a research project under the direction of Dr. Floyd Dunn, professor of chemistry.

The amount is a \$500 increase over that received last year for the same project which is entitled

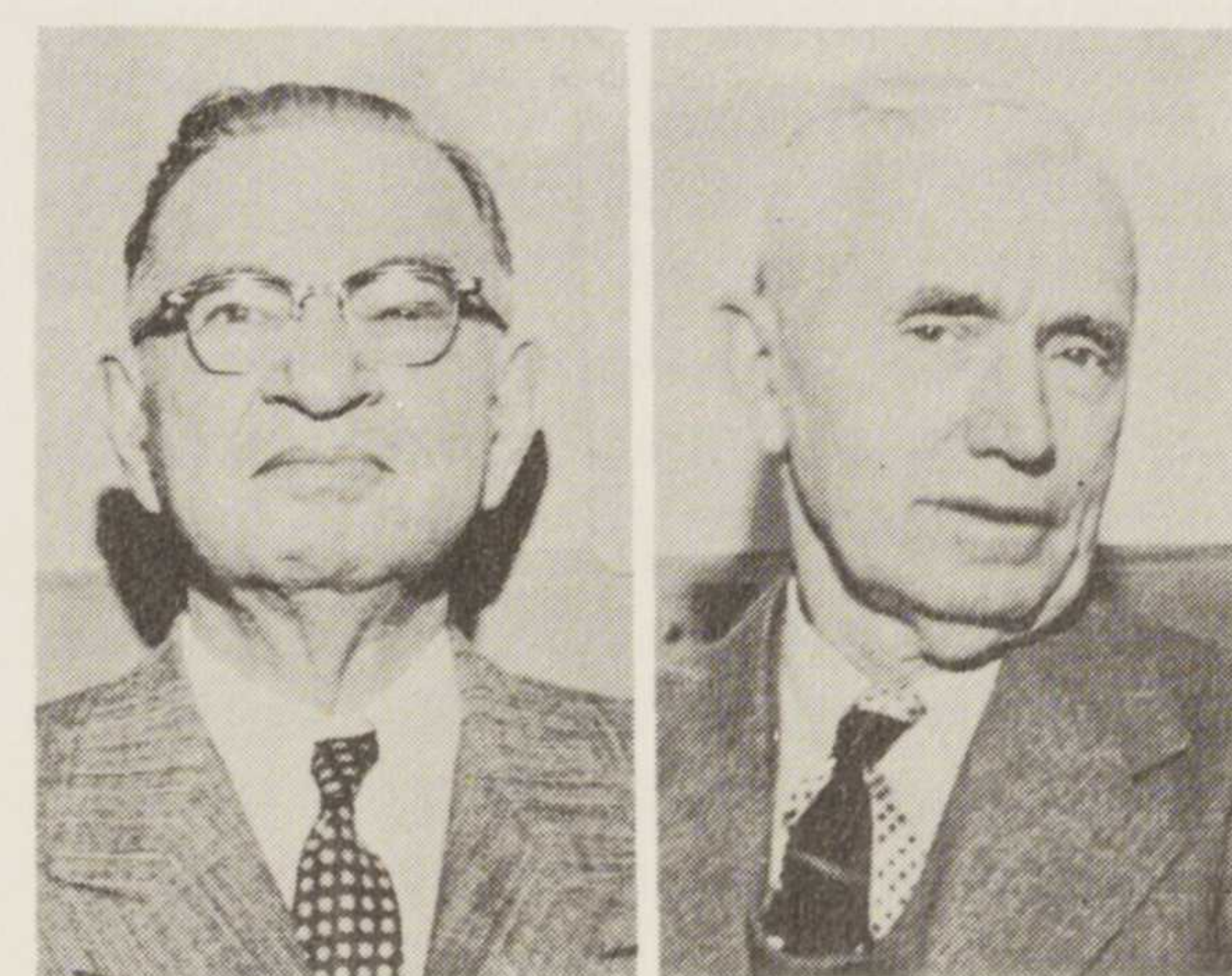
